COLLEGE PROFILE

Government Degree College Chopal, came into existence vide government of H.P., Department of Higher Education Notification No. EDN-A-Ka (1)-2/2014-Pt. on dated 24th September 2016 and became functional in 2017. A site located, half a kilometer from the main market Chopal has been identified for the construction of college building.

Being situated in rural surroundings, this college serves as a valuable resource for students from all panchayats of the area. Despite the lack of resources, the college strives to provide quality education to the students. For the time being the college is functional at NAC building Chopal with only 04 classrooms. The FCA case of our college has been approved by the Ministry of Environment and Forest. In the light of this approval, our college is diligently engaged in the necessary administrative processes required to accelerate the transfer of land from the forest department to the education department.

The Self-Assessment Report of our college serves as a vital tool for reflecting on our institutional performance during the session, 2024-25 and identifying areas for improvement and growth. This Self-Assessment Report helped us gain an invaluable insight into our strengths and weaknesses by evaluating various aspects such as academic standards, faculty progression, infrastructure and student services being provided by the college.
